THRIVE: BECOME A SPARK CHAMPION!

N! What's Your Spark?

What is THRIVING?

Thriving is a concept used to describe youth who progress along indicators ranging from exhibiting healthy habits to gaining a sense of purpose that leads to making contributions to society.

Research in youth development has shown youth by age ten discovering their talents, developing their interests, or having hidden strengths that are yet to be discovered. These talents, interests or strengths are the catalyst which motivate youth to succeed in achieving their goals in order to *Thrive* (Thrive Foundation for Youth, 2010).

What are SPARKS?

The term "Sparks" has been coined to describe the talents, interests, and strengths that motivate youth to achieve their goals. *Sparks* are motivating forces that provide a positive direction, purpose in life, or bring happiness to youth. Research has shown this internal motivation has been "associated with self-regulation, positive behavioral outcomes, and behavior change" (Heck, Subramaniam & Carlos, 2010).

Spark Development in Adolescence

Adolescence is a critical period for *Spark* development in youth. Adolescent youth are experiencing significant brain development, hormonal changes, identity formation and independence. For parents, this developmental period can be an emotional time in which passions — both negative and positive — are ignited.

Become Spark Champions

When working with youth, 4-H project leaders can guide and lead youth to positively identify and express their *Sparks*. Therefore, become a "Spark Champion" to 4-H youth. Assist youth to discover and pursue their *Sparks*.

Be on the lookout for upcoming curriculum and trainings that will allow volunteers to implement the concepts of Thriving, Sparks and Goal Setting into club leadership projects.



Val Elliott, Health Education Specialist, Yuba County Health and Human Services, Tobacco Education Program lead a discussion on the "Tobacco Influences in the Movies". The group discussed the health consequences related to tobacco use and how the social environment around the individuals influence I them to start using tobacco products such as cigarettes, cigars, pipes and chewing tobacco. The motion picture industry has been criticized in the past for the roll they play in exhibiting characters that smoke, whether they are the good guys or bad guys studies have shown that it encourages youth to experiment, which can lead to addiction. Ideas of how 4Her's can be pro active in eliminating the negative tol bacco influences in movies were discussed. The club is reviewing the possibilities of being active citizens by doing a letter writing campaign, a club resolution and helping out with tobacco litter clean up days at local parks.

4-H Fair Eligibility Rules

In order to exhibit at the 2011 Yuba-Sutter Fair, all 4-H members must meet the following requirements:

- Club/project enrollment by December 31, 2010.
- 80% or more attendance at club and project meeting of projects which will be exhibited at fair.
- Attendance at one or more Bi-County 4-H event.
- Presentation at appropriate club or county level.
 - ⇒ 1st —2nd year regular members may present at project, club or county level (*primary members are exempt*)
 - ⇒ 3rd—5th year regular members must present at club or county level.
 - ⇒ 6th year + members must present at county level.

 Clubs may have more strict rules, but not more lenient.

paid off! Jake, a male black lab, was placed with Daniel Hart, also of Austin, Texas. Mr. Hart is legally blind and Jake will be his fourth Guide Dog. Both recipients were forever grateful for their new Guide Dog partners and look forward to many years working with Clara and Jake.

Updates from the California State 4-H Office

2011 State 4-H Field Day

May 28, 2011 at UC Davis

4-H members may participate in a variety of contests. Some require prequalification and/or pre-registration and some are open to <u>all</u> during the event.



Events held at the State 4-H Field Day:

- ◆ **Presentation Day** (pre-qualification and pre-registration) Volunteer Judges provide written feedback to individual or teams of 4-H members on their presentations.
- State 4-H Fashion Revue (pre-qualification and preregistration) Volunteer judges provide feedback on 4-H members' clothing and accessory choices using criterionbased rubrics.
- State 4-H Plant Science Contest The contest is organized into three parts: judging, plant identification, and written test. The four highest ranking senior 4-H members are qualified to participate in the national contest.
- ♦ **Judging contest:** In each class, youth rank four items based on a standard; typically ten classes.
- State 4-H Photography Contest (pre-registration): 4-H members may submit two photographs in various categories.
- State 4-H Film Festival (pre-registration): Provides a venue for teams of 4-H members to showcase their films.
- ♦ State Interview Contest (pre-registration): Before the event, 4-H members select a mock job and develop a cover letter and resume. At the event, 4-H members are interviewed and evaluated by three judges using a rubric.
- ◆ **Logo Design Contest:** In the morning, 4-H members may submit their logo design for the following year's Field Day. In the afternoon, 4-H members vote on their favorite design.
- ◆ Festival of Science: Curious about how things work? Want to know more about something? University scientists will answer your questions! Provide your question ahead of the event and we will try to find the right scientist to provide answers to the most commonly asked questions.
- ◆ 4-H Horse Classic Equine Education Contests: The education contest provide opportunity for youth to gain knowledge and skills and be recognized for their efforts.

Exhibits and Displays:

Exhibit Application due April 1, 2011 (Applications can be found online) These exhibits are a great opportunity to share knowledge, interact with youth and adults, and engage people in new actives. The types of exhibits include:

- Community service activities
- New 4-H projects, curricula, and programs
- Affiliated University programs
- Activities for younger youth (5-8 years old)

Interested in sharing knowledge, interacting with youth and adults, and engaging people in new activities? Consider hosting an educational display, which could include an informative booth, hands-on activities, or community service crafts!
