POLICY REMINDERS AND UPDATES

New Parent/Adult Behavior Guidelines

The California 4-H Youth Development Program strives to provide quality leadership for youth participating in 4-H programs, events, and activities. The opportunity to work with youth is a privileged position of trust that should be held only by those who are willing to demonstrate behaviors that fulfill this trust.

Parents and adults helping in the 4-H Youth Development Program are expected to:

- * Treat others in a courteous, respectful manner demonstrating ethical behaviors appropriate to a positive role model for youth.
- * Abide by policies and guidelines of the California 4-H Youth Development Program state and county 4-H programs.
- * Obey all laws of the locality, state, and nation, including those related to use of illegal substances, or use of firearms.
- * Recognize that verbal, sexual, physical abuse, and/ or neglect of youth is unacceptable either within or outside the 4-H Youth Development Program.
- * Treat animals humanely and teach 4-H youth to provide appropriate animal care.
- * Operate machinery, vehicles, and other equipment in a safe and responsible manner, and only with a valid operator's license and the legally required insurance coverage.
- * Handle fundraising and finances in an ethical manner according to the policies and guidelines of the 4-H Youth Development Program.
- * Do not consume alcohol while responsible for youth in 4-H activities nor allow 4-H youth under your supervision to consume alcohol or illegal substances.
- * Deliver your child/ren on time for events and meetings, and pick up at the agreed upon time.
- * Avoid the use of obscene, impolite, and/or discriminatory language at any 4-H activity or where youth are present.

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Up Close and Personal With Carry Elkins and Riley High

Carry Elkins became a 4-H project leader 27 years ago after being a member since she was nine years old. She said she became one because she had sewing skills and there was a need for someone to lead a sewing group. She is now the Head Cook for the 4-H Summer Camp each year because she likes to cook and because she wanted to make sure the campers had a good meal. Campers would agree that she fulfills that need.

The most important traits that a 4-H volunteer leader can have, Carry says, is the ability to be understanding of the child, to have lots of patience, and to obtain the cooperation, support and involvement of the members' parents. She states it's important to understand that change is inevitable, but that it's also important to retain the strength of traditional ways.

Carry believes the greatest attributes of our bicounty 4-H Program are our summer camp, our good leadership program, and the great group of kids who are our members. The advice that she would like to share with new leaders is, "Hang in there. Don't expect too much the first time you do anything. There are rewards at the end of the year, but you have to work for it!"

Riley High started as a swine project leader 37 years ago when his eldest daughter became a youth member. He's also the swine project leader for the Lindhurst High School FFA. He started and stayed with both youth development programs because, "It's just one of those things that I've enjoyed and I wanted to stick with it." He has stuck with it throughout the years that his daughters were involved in 4-H and now, his grandchildren.

"Wanting to work with the kids, and keeping them on a balanced road," is one of the most important characteristics that 4-H volunteer leaders can possess or develop, Riley says. They also need to want to "be there" for the kids and help them along, and to be patient as they learn.

Riley believes that the annual Fashion Revue, the animal projects, and the hands-on approach that 4-H uses to help youth learn are the greatest highlights of our local 4-H Program. Hands-on learning projects, especially with the animals, really helps members, he says. It's also the best way for leaders to learn, too, Riley says, which is his recommendation to leaders just starting out. His other piece of advice is, "It takes a little wisdom and the willingness to devote a lot of time to help kids stay on the road, but it's worth it."



Question: What is the Bi-County Council and who can attend?

Answer: The Bi-County Council is responsible for planning, executing, evaluating and making local policies for the Sutter-Yuba 4-H Youth Development Program. All Project and Community leaders are members of the Council. An active member of the 4-H County Council shall have voting rights as long as their local Community Club is "active" and represented at two or more consecutive Council meetings. The Community Club becomes "inactive" and all members of the Club become ineligible to vote until the Community Club is again represented at two consecutive Council meetings. The activation of voting privileges will take place during the second consecutive regularly scheduled meeting attended. It is very important that all Community Clubs be represented at the Council meetings. We recommend that at least one leader be selected from each club to attend this meeting each month.
