

Message from Emily Schoenfelder ~ 4-H Youth Development Advisor

Sometimes I am amazed at the magnitude of organization that I am so honored to work for. Did you know that 4-H is the nation's largest youth development organization? It reaches over 6 million youth and is helped by over 600,000 volunteers! So how does it all work? How can 4-H empower so many?

Well, it's like this...

4-H has been able to make such an impact because it exists as the youth development program of the Cooperative Extension (CE) system. CE brings partners from federal, state, and local levels together to meet the specific needs people where they are in regards to agriculture, natural resources, community and economic development, youth, and more.

At the federal level, the National Institute of Food and Agriculture resources and enrichment they need – including the 4-H Youth (NIFA – part of the USDA) provides funding and program leadership to the CE system and Land Grant Universities. NIFA helps to ensure that 4-H is open to everyone and guides the program to address the trends of the entire nation.

Land Grant Universities are the partners at the state level. They provide 4-H staff to oversee the programs, as well as resources and research to keep the programs moving forward. In our state, the University of California Division of Agriculture and Natural Resources (UC ANR) does research to discover needs and best youth development practices – and then puts this information to good use by creating curriculum and new programs to better serve our youth and communities.

At the local level, counties provide support staff, buildings, vehicles and other many other invaluable sources of logistical and community support to help reach people in their towns and neighborhoods. Day to day office operations rely on the counties' support.

All of these partners have come together for more than 100 years to ensure that local communities have access to the

Development Program. It is only through this unique, multilayered partnership that 4-H has the ability to touch so many lives. Thank you for being a part of it!

CLOVER SAFE NOTES:

#6 Working Safely with Horses

U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission date indicate that in 2005 more than 400 youth aged 18 years and younger were treated in hospitals for injuries received while grooming, walking, bridling, or saddling horses. More injuries occurred when handlers were either kicked or stepped on by horses.

Horse Characteristics

Horses have a wild field vision that encompasses about 270 degrees from the front of the animal backwards to their rear haunches. Like humans, horses cannot see directly behind themselves unless they turn their heads. A horse's hearing and sense of smell are very good. There is a natural flight zone horses maintain between themselves and other animals, including people. Flight zones range from several hundred feet or more for wild horses to several feet or less for tame horses. It is normal behavior for a horse to kick when it is startled or surprised.

Working Safely With Horses

- Always wear appropriate clothing, including long pants, shirt, and boots or hard-toed shoes. Remove loose jewelry and pull back long hair with a band or wear long hair under a cap.
- It is a good safety practice to wear your equestrian helmet when grooming or working with horses.
- Approach horses on their left side and within their field of vision
- Put a halter on the horse you are going to work with
- Never walk beneath the neck of a horse that has its halter or reins tied to a post or other object.
- Make sure the horse knows where you are at all times



by speaking to the horse and/or keeping a hand on the horse's body.

- Never stand directly in front of or behind a
- Always stay on your feet when grooming a horse. Do not kneel when working with horses.
- Use the appropriate brush when grooming a horse. Avoid being kicked by standing to the side when brushing or combing a horse's tail.
- When cleaning a horse's hoof, slide your hand down the horse's leg and gently squeeze the lower limb (or fetlock) to get the horse to pick up its foot.
- Gently place the saddle pad and saddle on the horse. Reach beneath the horse to bring the girth across the fasten it firmly to the left side of the saddle. Never crawl beneath a horse.
- Carefully draw the bridle over the horse's nose. Slip the bit into the horse's mouth and the crown piece over the ears. Snugly fasten the throat strop and hose band under the horse's chin
- When walking a horse, position yourself at the horse's left shoulder and use your right elbow to guide the horse to the right.
- To change a horse's direction, turn the horse away from you (to the right) to avoid being stepped on
- Promptly report any injuries to or from horses to your group leader, parent, or guardian.
- Always wash your hands with soap and water after touching a horse or any other animal.
