#### Map out a plan

If you collect 1000 blankets, who will you give them to and how will you get them where they need to be? Are blankets what are really needed? The only way to answer these questions is to have a good plan with plenty of support in place BEFORE you start your project. This will ensure that your efforts to make a difference will be successful and sustainable.

**Contact organizations that are able to accept goods BEFORE you start collecting items.** Organizations have different needs at different times during disaster recovery efforts. Unsolicited donated goods such as used clothing, household items, and mixed foodstuff require agencies to redirect their valuable resources *away* from providing relief services. They will have to sort, package, transport, warehouse, and distribute items that may not even meet the needs of disaster survivors.

Instead: Use the Service Learning Toolkit and Project Planning Guide to help you plan a disaster relief project.

#### Find reputable local organizations to support

The best way to help in disaster areas is to support relief organizations that are already established in the area.

Some ways to verify relief organizations:

- 1. <u>Give.org</u>- the BBB Wise Giving Alliance
- 2. The State Of California has vetted both volunteer opportunities and organizations that are supporting relief efforts. <u>CaliforniaVolunteers</u> is the state office that manages programs and initiatives aimed at increasing the number of Californians engaged in service and volunteering. Their <u>Current Disasters</u> webpage links to resources for current information on disaster areas in California.

As an individual, you can make personal monetary donations to organizations to support relief efforts.

There are many organizations that are accepting cash donations. The Golden Valley Bank Foundation has set up a <u>fund to</u> <u>directly support 4-H, FFA and Grange members and their families affected by the Camp Fire</u>.

# **4-H RECORD BOOKS**

# ORB Myth Busters

As we have launched into year 3 of the 4-H Online Record Book (ORB), we wanted to p facts in response to the 10 most common ORB myths.

The truth is that while we believe that ORB is a great tool for our 4-H youth members to le 21<sup>st</sup> Century skills, including record keeping, no 4-H member is REQUIRED to use ORB. Myth #2—ORB has so many bugs in the system that it is impossible for members to successfully

The truth is that ORB does work! There are some glitches in the system and programmers are hard at work developing solutions. For the past two program years, youth have been able to successfully submit record books for county and state judging. This year, some counties have reported over half of members who submitted record books to county competition did so using the ORB system

The truth is that ORB has over 6,000 people using the system across the state representing every single county! Some youth have reported that because of ORB they have completed a record book for the

Myth #4—If you use ORB to complete your record book, you have to submit it electronically for

#### judging.

The truth is that record books, whether completed in ORB, typed on a computer, or printed by hand, need to be submitted in hardcopy for county and state judging. The only difference between ORB and the paper copies (besides looking a little different) is that an ORB completed record book automatically has the correct formatting options and saves time by not having to enter items multiple times on

different forms in most cases.

The truth is that ORB is also for adult volunteers and staff. Everyone registered as either a 4-H member Myth #5—ORB is just for 4-H members. (ages 9 and up) or an adult volunteer in the 4hOnline enrollment system automatically has an ORB account. Adult volunteers who are club and project leaders can review and approve member reports for members in their club or project, they can communicate with their members, and see some basic statistics about their club or project. Adults can also keep track of their volunteer hours and activities in ORB

- 3. How do I change my years in project? Change your years in project in your 4hOnline profile. Click "Edit" next to your name on the Member/Volunteer List, go to the Projects tab in Participation, click "Edit" next to project on your Project List, select years in project, then click "Update".
- 4. How do I change my years in 4-H? Years in 4-H is calculated by 4hOnline and cannot be changed.
- 5. How do I change my default club? Click "Settings" under Profile on the ORB homepage, select the club next to Set Default Club, then click "Save Settings".
- 6. How do I change my past star ranking counts? Click "Star Ranking" under Personal Development on the ORB homepage, click 'Enter Default Values" under Default Values, then click "Save".

#### **Record Book questions:**

1. How do I add or delete a project? Projects for the current program year can be changed in your 4hOnline profile. Projects for previous program years cannot be changed.

2. What do I do if I do not have a Leadership Development Report for a project that I am the Teen or Junior Leader of or if I have a Leadership Development Report for a project that I am not the Teen or Junior Leader of? Change your volunteer type for the project in your 4hOnline profile. Click "Edit" next to your name on the Member/ Volunteer List, go to the Projects tab in Participation, click "Edit" next to project on your Project List, select volunteer type, then click "Update".

Myth #6—If my club or project leader is not using ORB, I cannot use ORB as a 4-H member The truth is that ORB was designed knowing that in some cases adult volunteers would not want to use or may not have access to ORB. All record books are based on submission and not on approval. If 4-H club and/or project leaders are not currently using the system, members need to simply print out the

record book and get the appropriate "wet" signatures. Myth #7—ORB will make it easier for a 4-H member to complete their entire record book at the last

The truth is that ORB is designed to be most effective when used as a true record keeping system. It is designed to make it easy for 4-H members to complete their record books on a regular basis throughout the year and will not work as effectively for those who wait until the last minute to try and recall all that they did throughout the year. It truly is designed to help youth learn effective record book keeping

# Myth #8—ORB was designed by those without knowledge of a record book and they did not take

youth input into consideration. The truth is that ORB was designed through a partnership of 4-H members, volunteers, and staff from across the state. These youth and volunteers also helped beta test the system before its public launch in September 2011. Currently, the State 4-H Office coordinates an ORB Support Team, composed of youth and volunteers, charged with offering design suggestions as well as help in the process of creating help aids for the record book. Also, know that many staff in the State 4-H Office completed record books when they were 4-H members (some longer ago than others)!

Myth #9—I'm on my own to figure out the ORB system.

The truth is that there are a number of ways to get assistance with using ORB. We have posted webinars from the Fall of 2012 on the state website that while older can still help with the basic functions. There is also a place on each person's ORB to ask a question, report a problem or make a suggestion. Finally, the State 4-H Office regularly provides educational workshops on ORB at camps and conferences and also offers a comprehensive and interactive workshop on the system that counties can

# Myth #10—ORB alienates rural area 4-H members and volunteers from completing their record books.

The truth is that ORB builds 21<sup>st</sup> century skills in our 4-H members and volunteers that paper/computer generated copies of the record book don't. Members who live in more rural areas may experience significantly more challenges and may need to be much more creative in utilizing the ORB system if they wish to do so. As mentioned above, ORB is not mandatory and the correct, downloadable Word and .PDF versions of the record book are still available on the state website for those that have limited or no access to the internet. Your county office can print these forms out for you.
