"Creating Safe and Successful Spaces for Our Youth" By Willa Davis

Almost 40 project and community leaders as well as youth members attended a training session on "Creating Safe and Successful Spaces for Our Youth", presented by myself, Nancy Perkins, Franklin Community Club Leader, and Katie Bogdonoff, Franklin Club Member, on February 9th as part of the monthly Bi-County Council meeting. A potluck dinner preceded the training session.

The purpose of the presentation was to train our leaders in University of California/State 4-H Office policies and suggested procedures for protecting our youth, ourselves and each other.

The presentation team supported the achievement of that goal by introducing youth development theories and practices and how keeping youth safe relates to their success, by giving training participants statistics, definitions and indicators of child abuse, and by engaging them in interactive exercises so they could decide what practices would be best given various circumstances that leaders may find themselves in.

These included what to do if youth members aren't picked up soon after a meeting ends, or if a second leader

or other adult isn't present when a meeting is suppose to start, or if a leader needs to transport youth to and/or from a 4-H activity alone.

Many excellent recommendations resulted from these brainstorming groups and have been added to the list of suggested procedures provided by the University and State 4-H Office. Others are pending approval to be included in the Policy Manual. All are appreciated.

Another training session will be presented at the March 20th Hi 4-H meeting. All teens are invited to attend this important presentation. Parents are welcomed in addition to leaders who were not able to attend the February training session. The focus of this presentation will be on youth leader training and supervision, and will also include information about safe dating practices for teens. Pizza will be served prior to the start of the presentation, thanks to the generosity of the Franklin 4-H Club. Please RSVP to the 4-H Office by March 17th so we will know how many pizzas to order.

- A & B: **Attendance** at **80% or more** Community Club *and* Project meetings make you eligible for this.
- D: Field Day: Attendance at the "Bi-County Goat and Sheep Day" this month counts here.
- G: **Judging Contest:** Judging at field day events and Presentation Day earns you points for this.
- I: Will you serve as M.C. or Room Coordinator at Presentation Day in March? If so, count it here. If eligible, you have other opportunities to serve in these roles at Spring Fair Presentation Day.
- K: **Jr./Teen Leaders:** Volunteer as a 4-H Camp Counselor in June to make a difference in the life of younger members and earn star rank points, too!
- L: **Prepare and Give Talk:** There's still time to give a talk about your projects at your monthly club meeting.
- O: **Medalist**: Those who have earned a gold at County and Sectional Presentation Day count points here; so do medalists at next month's Fashion Revue.
- S: **Projects Completed:** Make sure you keep your project records up to date and approved by your leaders in order to count points here.
- U: **Events Attended:** Attendance as a spectator or participant at Craft Day, Fashion Revue, Goat and Sheep Day, and other County events earns you points.

POLICY REMINDERS AND UPDATES

- FAIR ELIGIBILITY: All project leaders are required to submit a signed roster of members in each of their projects or their members will not be eligible to show in any category (not just animal divisions) at this year's County Fair. More eligibility rules will be included in future Clover Chatter issues please look for inserts.
- FACILITY USE AGREEMENTS: When using non-Cooperative Extension facilities for 4-H activities., project meetings, and events, a facility use agreement must be completed and signed by the County Director AND the facility office personnel. A minimum of 15 working days before the meetings, event or activity should be allowed for processing agreements in order for a certificate of insurance to be issued by the ANR Risk Manager. 4-H-related events, meetings and activities will not take place until the certificate of insurance is received by the County 4-H Office.
- FUNDRAISERS: When holding fundraisers for your project or club, you need to first complete and submit for approval to the County 4-H Office a "Fundraiser Notification" form. A "Fundraiser Summary" form needs to be turned into the office within one working day after the fundraiser.
- EQUESTRIAN HELMETS: All youth and volunteers, regardless of riding seat, shall wear a properly fitted equestrian helmet which meets ASTM/SEI standards, with secured chin harness properly fastened at all times when mounted on a horse or in a vehicle being pulled by one or more horses as part of any 4-H equestrian activity. Individuals found to be wearing an unapproved or defective helmet or other head gear will not be permitted to participate in any mounted or driving activity until a proper helmet is acquired.
- ALCOHOL, ILLEGAL DRUGS, AND TOBACCO: Volunteers shall not consume or be under the influence of alcohol, illegal drugs or tobacco while performing their 4-H duties. . . . The use of alcohol is prohibited at all 4-H functions. . . . 4-H program activities are conducted under tobacco-free conditions.

Up Close and Personal With Tracy Bishop and Debbie Tarke

Tracy Bishop started as a 4-H volunteer leader 20 years ago after having been a youth member herself. She now serves as Community Club Leader for the Wheatland 4-H Club and sits on many committees as a member or chairperson. She says she wanted to become a leader in order to help kids become our future leaders, both in 4-H and in their community.

Tracy says she stays in the program for the same reason - to help our youth grow and to watch them develop their leadership abilities and gain valuable community service experience. Growth occurs in the Sutter/Yuba Counties 4-H Youth Development Program, too, as it continues to redevelop itself and change with the times, which, Tracy says, is the main thing that sets it apart from other youth programs.

Tracy goes on to say that having the ability to compromise, being willing to implement policies that club youth officers decide on and to serve as a buffer for them, as well as having a sense of humor are the most important characteristics that a 4-H leader can have or develop. Her advice to new volunteer leaders is, "Hang in there and be patient, roll with the punches, and find a way to energize the kids." It's sound advice that has kept her going for a long time.

Debbie Tarke started as a project leader seven years ago and now serves as the Community Club Leader for the Sutter Buttes 4-H Club and sits on the Bi-County Council as Sutter County's Treasurer. She, too, first started in 4-H as a youth member and continued in it as an adult because she really believes in it as a youth development program.

Debbie reports that she loves working directly with 4-H members as she loved helping her students when she was employed as a teacher. It is that love of youth, the desire to involve her own children in 4-H, and the personal reward she receives that keeps her in 4-H. She believes that families who are devoted to 4-H, and the strong 4-H heritage in the Yuba-Sutter area is what makes our local youth development program stand out. She believes that the most important traits 4-H leaders can possess are: being organized, committing the time needed for the program, and having fun with the kids. Her advice to new leaders is, "Be open to new ideas, get other parents involved to help and learn to delegate. Also, have fun with the kids!"





The 4-H State Ambassador Program is a working honor that provides older 4-H members expanded opportunities to serve the 4-H Youth Development program. The position of a 4-H State Ambassador is one of the highest recognitions attainable in the California 4-H Youth Development Program. Youth, ages 16 - 19 and adult advisors are selected for their demonstrated leadership skills, ability to work in diverse groups, competence to professional represent the 4-H Youth Development Program, experience in event planning and delivery, and a commitment to citizenship and community service. 4-H State Ambassadors serve a fourteen-month term in which they conduct a statewide service-project, represent 4-H to foundations and organizations, and coordinate the California 4-H State Leadership Conference.

Each year, outstanding 4-H youth members and adult volunteer leaders of the California 4-H Youth Development Program are selected to the statewide 4-H State Ambassador Program. Selection is awarded based on demonstrated ability in citizenship, leadership, and total achievement in the 4-H Program. Selection of State Ambassador members and advisors also reflects the diversity of the Sections and counties from which they are drawn.





- Olson Hall is diagonally across the "Quad" from Wellman Hall, location of State Field Day

- Must be at least 50% recycled
- Before and after photographs required

• Use needle arts, i.e. knitting, crochet, weaving, etc. to create a garment(s)

Wearable Art - Embellished Clothing

• Decorate a garment(s) using arts and crafts techniques

For all Categories
