In the April issue of "Clover Chatter", I introduced the *four essential elements* of positive youth development that the National and State 4-H Program has adopted. They are: **Belonging, Mastery, Independence, and Generosity**.

Last month, I briefly explained what is meant by "Belonging". In this edition, I will provide a short review on the other elements.

Mastery: Research reveals that in order to develop their self-confidence, youth need to feel and believe they are capable. By exploring projects and activities, 4-H members master skills to make positive career and life choices. Additionally, youth need to have a safe environment for making mistakes and getting feedback. Finally, youth need the breadth and depth of topics that

allow them to pursue their own interests. The 4-H Program provides both a safe atmosphere and a wide variety of projects to meet the needs and interests of its members.

Independence: Youth need to know that they are able to influence people and events through their own decision-making and actions. 4-H members do this through the leadership opportunities that the program provides, which in turn, helps them mature in self-discipline and responsibility. As a positive outcome, they better understand themselves and become independent thinkers.

Generosity: Youth need to feel their lives have meaning and purpose. By participating in 4-H community service and citizenship activities, members can connect to their community and learn (cont'd on p. 3)

A hard copy of the Exhibitors Guide can also be viewed at the 4-H Office. However, the following are especially important for you to remember:
- 1. NEW—All animal exhibitors will be required to show proof of insurance when they submit their entry form. You may buy insurance from the Fair Board (see pg. 7 under "Local Rules and Information" in the Exhibitors Guide).
- 2. All RVs and trailers must be in place on Sunday, July 30, 2006 by 9:00 p.m.
- 3. Mandatory Health Inspection— All Jr. and Sr. animals must go through the health inspection on Monday, July 31, 2006 from 8:00 a.m.—5:00 p.m. There is an exception with poultry health inspection, which is Tuesday, August 1, 2006 from 8:00 a.m.—12:00 noon. Also, rabbits are not health inspected (see "Competitive and Livestock Schedules" regarding this in the Exhibitors Guide).
- 4. READ THE EXHIBITORS GUIDE. THERE ARE MANY CHANGES THAT WILL AFFECT YOU. **CALL THE FAIR OFFICE AT 674-1280 IF YOU** HAVE QUESTIONS.

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ABCs Of Personal Development

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This month and in the coming months there are many projects, events and activities in which you could record points as follows:

A & B: Attendance at 80% or more Community Club and Project meetings make you eligible for this.

D: Field Day: Attendance at the "Fashion Revue" last month and Spring Fair this month counts here.

G: Judging Contest: Judging at field day events and Spring Fair Presentation Day earns you points.

I: Will you serve as a **Clerk** or **Room Coordinator** at Spring Fair?

K: 8th Grade Jr. Leaders and Teen Leaders: Volunteer as a 4-H Camp Counselor in June to make a difference in the life of younger members and earn star rank points, too.

O: Medalist: Those who have earned a gold at County and Sectional Presentation Day count points here; so do medalists at last month's Fashion Revue.

P: Project Exhibit: Which projects are you going to exhibit at Spring Fair?

R: Demonstrations or Presentations: How many more presentations do you need to earn a '5 Presentation' pin and to earn points here?

S: Projects Completed: Make sure you keep your project records up to date and approved by your leaders in order to count points here.

V: County Winner: Fashion Revue 1st place and Spring Fair Round Robin winners earn these points.

FIGHT BAC! KEEP FOOD SAFE FROM BACTERIA

One out of four people now suffers from food borne illness each year. Let's promote safe food practices instead!

- When you shop and store food: Buy cold food last, get it home fast.
- When You Prepare Food: Keep food separate; don't cross contaminate.
- When You Cook Food: Cook it well.
- When You Transport Food: Keep hot food hot and cold food cold.
- When You Serve Food: Never leave food out for more than 2 hours. Keep serving area clean.
- When You Handle Leftovers: Wash often, refrigerate quickly, reheat properly.

POLICY REMINDERS AND UPDATES

- Parental Behavior Guidelines have been drafted by the Policy Advisory Committee and will be ready for distribution after the June Policy Committee meeting.
- Fairs, shows, exhibitions and similar events involving 4-H members and their animals shall be conducted according to humane animal care standards. Special attention is needed for transportation, safe housing, adequate feed and water, ample space, humane handling, facility design, and proper management and showmanship.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

What Is Maturity?

- Maturity is the ability to control anger and settle differences without violence and destruction.
- Maturity is patience. It is the willingness to pass up immediate pleasure in favor of the long-term gain.
- Maturity is perseverance. It is the ability to sweat out a project or a situation in spite of heavy opposition or discouraging setbacks.
- Maturity is the capacity to face unpleasantness and frustration, discomfort and defeat, without complaint or collapse.
- Maturity is humility. It is being big enough to say, "I was wrong." And, when right, the mature person needs not experience the satisfaction of saying, "I told you so."
- Maturity is the ability to make a decision and stand by it. Immature people spend their lives exploring endless possibilities, then do nothing.
- Maturity means dependability, keeping one's
 word, coming through in a crisis. Immature people are masters of the alibi. They are the confused
 and the disorganized. Their lives are a maze of
 broken promises, former friends, unfinished business and good intentions that somehow never materialize.
- Maturity is the art of living in peace with that which we cannot change, the courage to change which needs to be changed—and the wisdom to know the difference.

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Up Close and Personal With Dianna Taylor and Kathy Walker

Dianna Taylor is the Community Club Leader of the Smartsville 4-H Club, having started as a 4-H leader when she was 19 years old. She was a 4-H member as a youth and wanted to give to others what she had been taught.

Dianna has stayed a volunteer leader because of her belief in 4-H as a great organization for youth to be part of. It not only teaches them skills, such as public speaking, but also how to take responsibility and give respect to their elders and others. They also develop self-confidence to find out and try new things.

Dianna goes on to say that the most important characteristics that a 4-H volunteer leader can possess or develop includes lots of patience and learning how to communicate with different kids. What might work for one may not work for others.

Dianna believes what makes our local 4-H Program stand out is the way our kids work hard on their projects that results in a good quality end product they can proudly show, whether it be an animal at the County Fair, a demonstration at Presentation Day or a garment at Fashion Revue. The advice she wants to give new leaders is, "Don't be afraid to make mistakes, just try. And, ask questions. There's always someone willing to help, because 4-Hers help 4-Hers."

Kathy Walker started in 4-H as a youth member, too. She wanted to become a volunteer leader because of the positive experiences she had as a youth, including making both friends and memories, and wanted her son and other kids in the community to be able to have those same opportunities.

Kathy became both a project leader and the Community Club Leader for the Live Oak 4-H Club about four years ago, and has enjoyed seeing the club grow from offering seven projects to over 20 of them, now. She believes that 4-H volunteer leaders need to enjoy working with kids, to have fun with them, and to want to serve as positive role models for them.

Kathy believes the best thing about our 4-H Program is the friendliness of both the volunteers and members. Some of her best friends are other leaders and she sees how our members make sure no one feels like an outsider. Her advice to new leaders is, "Keep it fun, seek out help when you need it, and remember, it's about the kids."
