- D: Attendance at the "Livestock Leaders and Educators Symposium" last month counts here.
- F: Committee Chairperson: What club committee will you commit to lead this year? Make it fun for you!
- H: Writing an article promoting 4-H for the local newspaper or for your school newsletter, OR by writing an article for the "Clover Chatter"!
- I: Did you serve as **M.C.** at **Achievement Night** or did you make a **presentation** about 4-H **during "Red Ribbon Week"?** If so, count it here.
- J: Committee Member: Each time you help plan or coordinate a 4-H activity, you are on a committee.
- M: Offices Held: Congratulations to those who are serving in an official role this year!
- Q: Participation Other Than 4-H: Are you a member of a school choir, church youth groups or an after-school sports team? It earns points here if you are.
- T: Planned Group Activity: Helping to plan club activities for National 4-H Week earned you points.
- U: **Attending** the "**Fashion Revue**" workshop in October and participating in the upcoming "**Craft Day**" earns these points (plus, you'll have fun and make crafts for the holidays!).

"Creating Safe and Successful Spaces for Our Youth" by Katie Bogdonoff

On October 15th, I participated in a regional training with Franklin 4-H Community Club Leader, Nancy Perkins, and 4-H Program Rep., Willa Davis, on how to keep our 4-H kids safe. We learned about four types of child abuse and the physical and emotional effects they have on children and youth. We also learned about related policies that the California 4-H Office is revising, and everyone brainstormed answers to the following: "How do I transport youth when I'm alone?", "How do I protect myself and the 4-H youth when traveling overnight?", "How do I recognize child abuse?", and "What should I do if I suspect child abuse?"

These new "Section 800" Health and Safety policies need to be fully implemented by the 2006-2007 Program Year to provide successful and safe spaces for our children and young teens. The policies will include safe dating practices, too.

Additionally, we participated in *learning by doing* activities about the **four essential elements for youth development** that the California 4-H Office has adopted. These elements include: *Belonging*, *Mastery*, *Independence*, and *Generosity*.

Willa, Nancy and I will be making presentations about the training at New Leader Orientations, and at Bi-County Council and Hi 4-H Club meetings after the New Year. POLICY REMINDERS AND UPDATES

Important Reminders:

- Remember, safety is the #1 priority in 4-H. All project work topics will have a safety awareness/training element. Project work will not begin until all safety issues have been determined and addressed. . . . Practice safety at all times.
- Until you have attended the certification training and had your fingerprints returned "clear" by the Dept. of Justice, you MUST have a certified leader co-lead your project meetings.
- Only the County Director can sign facility use agreements.

Up Close and Personal With Tommie Mettz and Nancy Perkins

"Believe in kids' capabilities, and learn to let them do their own work" is the advice Mrs. Loeta (also known as Tommie) Mettz wants to give new 4-H volunteer leaders. It was that conviction that led Mrs. Mettz to become a 4-H adult leader 45 years ago in order to ensure her own daughters' abilities were allowed to be developed. She demonstrates her belief in young people as she continues in her role as Primary Community Club Leader for the Dententer 4-H Club by guiding, teaching and leading them to become self-sufficient adults.

The most important trait volunteer leaders can possess, is to care enough about children to let them learn and grow by doing it themselves. It's what makes the Sutter/Yuba Counties 4-H a worthwhile program, states Mrs. Mettz, and it's what helps our youth give superior demonstrations. She says our program is also top-notch because of the guidance and leadership of the staff at the local 4-H Office.

We can all take Mrs. Mettz's lead about how best to help our youth grow. She says, "Respect them, talk to them and believe in them."

Nancy Perkins is Vice-President for Sutter County on the Bi-County Council and serves as Community Club Leader for the Franklin 4-H Club. She started with 4-H 20 years ago when her daughter enrolled, but she's really been involved in 4-H since she was 5 years old when she "tagged along" with her Project Leader parents and grandmother.

Nancy says she has stayed involved throughout her life because, "I am proud to see kids start as shy little children and grow into confident, responsible leaders." She believes what makes our 4-H Program stand out above other ones is our animal projects and the way members can learn both how to be competitive and also stay together as a cohesive group.

Nancy stated that the most important traits that 4-H Volunteer Leaders can possess are compassion and understanding, and "the ability to see situations through the eyes of a young person." Her advice to new volunteer leaders is, "Go with the flow and don't sweat the small stuff." - wise words for us all.

# Meg Quisenberry and Eileen Whitcomb are Winners of the 2004-2005 Senior Awards



Sutter Co. Senior Award recipient, Megan Quisenberry, now a nursing major in college, started in 4-H at 9 years old. She stayed in 4-H until she "aged out", in large part due to the active involvement of her parents in it, because she loved to "show" at the County Fair and because she wanted to be involved in her community.

Meg's first project was dog care and training, then she progressed to raising and showing sheep. She says that the most important things she learned in 4-H was working on and chairing a committee; the importance of giving back to one's community; and how lucky youth are to have community support for such a great program like 4-H.

Meg also states what she liked best about 4-H were, "The people and all the different activities that you can get involved in; the adult leadership whose dedication allows us to participate in such a great program; and the leadership skills members can learn by being involved in 4-H."

Meg's advice to 4-H youth members who are just starting out in the program is, "Take full advantage of all that 4-H has to offer. Become an officer or chair a committee. Just be as involved as you can be while in 4.-H. And, when you can, give back to the program. I know when I have kids I want to get them involved in 4-H!"

Eileen Whitcomb, Yuba County Senior Award winner, enrolled in 4-H at the tender age of 6 years. She stayed involved because of the opportunities to learn from older youth members and then, wanting to help younger members learn all about 4-H and growing as a result of it.

Eileen became involved with various animal science projects while in 4-H, starting with poultry and pygmy goats, then dog care and training. Next, she progressed to lambs, swine, and beef cattle. She ultimately got rid of all animals except for the cattle, which her parents are still caring for while she attends college as an Animal Science major. She's unsure of the kind of job she will seek after graduation, maybe as a Coop. Ext. Farm Advisor!

Eileen says the most important things she learned in 4-H were responsibility and being dedicated—to keep track of and attend meetings, to keep her Record Book updated, and of course, to care for her animals. And, she learned to have fun with others who shared her interests and who had the same sense of purpose. What she learned was mirrored in what she also liked best about 4-H.

"Take it slow and don't push yourself, stick with it, and have fun!" is Eileen's advice to younger members.
