The Bi-County Council has voted to change their Bylaws to reflect the following:

Active Members: An active member of the 4H County Council shall have voting rights as long as their local 4H Community Club is "active" and represented at the County Council meetings. If a Community Club is not represented for two or more consecutive Council meetings, the Community Club becomes "inactive" and all members of the Club become ineligible to vote until the Community Club is again represented at two consecutive Council meetings. The activation of voting privileges will take place during the second consecutive regularly scheduled meeting attended.

Also, the Bi-County Council has voted to change the day and time of the monthly Council meetings to the second Thursday of every month. The Council meets at 7pm at the 4H office.

The next Bi-county Council meeting is scheduled for October 14th, 2004.

PROJECT PROFICIENCIES

Project Proficiencies booklets are available to project leaders for the following projects:

Animal Science
Camping and Outdoors
Clothing and Textiles
Creative Arts and Crafts
Foods and Nutrition
Leadership
Plant Science
Citizenship

Project Proficiency booklets are designed to serve as a working checklist and reward system. Members track where they are in their project knowledge and skills. Skills are identified that are to be accomplished in order to earn pins in each of five levels of competency in the project. This recognition is available for every 4H member; except primary members, based on self achievements and not in competition with others. In addition, the proficiencies can act as a leaders guide for what to teach in the project.

Leaders may sign off any of the items. Levels must be completed in order. Members must complete all of the listed skills to earn the pin. Primary members may not participate in the proficiency program as it is an incentive and an awards program designed for older members. Make A Difference Day Project Ideas

PROVIDE THE BASICS: For the second year, Jessica Burris, 13, collected socks for the homeless – 8,500 pairs to date – and rallied the community to also donate blankets, clothing and \$400 to buy medicine for them in Convers, GA.

RECYCLE TOYS: With the help of 13 family members, Ed and Millie Connolley of Hilmar, CA. - who since 1983 have carefully repaired and refurbished thousands of toys for a second chance at love - on Make A Difference Day collected enough castoffs for more than 1,000 needy children.

RECRUIT FRIENDS: Jamie Farmer, 14, enlisted friends and others to raise \$2,300 on Make A Difference Day by selling candy at 25 sites in two towns to benefit a domestic violence shelter in Illinois.

CONSULT SHELTER WISH LISTS: Rosemary Lincoln-Clark and Gloria Jardine in Massachusetts collected clothes and toys and held a raffle on Make A Difference Day to buy a vacuum cleaner for a woman's shelter.

CLEAN OUT YOUR CLOSETS: Peggy Pinder gave clothes collected from family and friends to two agencies that help the homeless in De Ridder, LA.

MONEY FOR GLASSES, SCHOLARSHIPS: The Ellington (MO) Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce held a fall festival, parade and auction that raised more than \$3,000 for, among other things, local scholarship funds and a children's eyeglasses bank.

NEWCOMERS WELCOMED WITH EVENT: In Lenoir City (Tenn.) HOPE, an adult volunteer organization, held a Make A Difference Day Readin' and Rummagin' Day to benefit recent Mexican immigrants. Participants were given plan money to purchase items donated by a church and were read to in both Spanish and English.

HELP YOUR OLD SCHOOL: Alumni of St. Angela's grade school in Chicago, IL., restored luster to their 80-year-old alma mater, located in a neighborhood plagued by poverty and crime, by coming together on Make A Difference Day to paint classrooms, install proper lighting in the halls and a new sidewalk, repair broken doors, as well as donate \$900.

RALLY YOUR COMMUNITY: For the fourth Make A Difference Day in a row, Washington County Anti-Drug Task Force in Greenville, MS., rallied churches, schools, businesses, clubs and town folds in this 800-squiare-mile Delta community to spruce up neighborhoods, roads and parks; raise the spirits of the needy with home repairs; and bring people together by converting an old school into a community center.


BECOME A TRADITION: For the fifth year, Santa Fe, N.M., teens from Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church helped poor and homeless families, abused children and seniors. On Make A Difference Day, they raised \$2,200 by hosting an enchilada dinner and a bake sale to buy car seats, strollers, playpens, clothing, blankets and toys for children in state foster care and for Habitat for Humanity, as well as host a social honoring seniors.

LINK UP WITH NATIONAL PROJECTS: The 341st Communications Squadron at Malstrom Air Force Base in Great Falls, MT., combined a nationwide effort to connect classrooms to the Internet by the year 2000 with the national day of volunteering by 'wiring' Huntley Projects Junior High School in Worden on Make A Difference Day.

BE A CRAFTY GROUP: A group of young-hearted residents of Town and Country Nursing Home known as The Doll Makers brought comfort to sick kids at two Minden, LA., area hospitals on Make A Difference Day by presenting them with handmade dolls they made from buttons, fabric and love.

HELP YOUR LIBRARY: John Wesley Fellowship, the adult Sunday school class of First United Methodist Church in Ozark, AL., restored order and beauty to the town library when members, ages 60-80, tackled long-overdue card cataloguing and yard work at the 40-year-old building, from indexing thousands of cards, planting dozens of pansies to hauling away four truckloads of trash and yard waste.

HELF THE ENVIRONMENT: Madison County Special Waste Task Force in Arkansas collected oil, paint, batteries and pesticides in an effort to keep toxic waste out of landfills.
