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************* Star Rank Judging *******

Nineteen Record Books for star rank were submitted for judging in September. Congratulations to all who earned their Bronze, Silver and Gold Stars. Those who have earned Gold Stars now have the opportunity to work toward Emerald Star Rank and All Star Rank.

Now that the new Program Year has begun, it's time to meet with your 4-H Club leaders to decide what you want your goals to be this year, both for personal development and star rank accomplishment.

Remember, record your 4-H participation in the categories you most need the points. Some activities can go in more than one place, so review the categories carefully to determine which one is the best for you.

Each effort may be counted only once, but it is possible, however, to accomplish more than one item at one event, such as at County Fair.

Example: **P**—Project exhibited (animal)

Z—Showmanship (showing that animal)

W—Individual Achievement (placing in Showmanship)

Refer to the Star Rank Judging Guidelines on the local 4-H website at www.cesutter.ucdavis.edu and in the "ABCs for Personal Development" column on page 2 of this issue for clarification about recording your 4-H participation. Ask your leaders for help, too, or call the 4-H Office.

- A & B: **Attendance** at **80% or more** Community Club and Project meetings make you eligible for this.
- C: Attendance at 4-H Summer Camp.
- E: Attendance at the WHY Conference this month.
- F: Committee Chairperson: Did you lead your club's National 4-H Week activities?
- H: Writing an article promoting 4-H for the local newspaper or for your school newsletter.
- I: Wearing your **4-H uniform to school** during 4-H Week or to church on 4-H Sunday earns you points.
- J: Committee Member: Each time you help plan or coordinate a 4-H activity, you are on a committee.
- K: **Prepare and Give Talk**: Have you given a talk about 4-H at a PTA, Community Service Club meeting, or elsewhere? If so, count it here.
- M: **Offices Held**: Think about serving in an official role this year!
- P: **Project Exhibit**: Exhibiting your project at any 4-H activity.
- Q: Participation Other Than 4-H: Participation in choir, youth groups and other community events.
- T: **Planned Group Activity**: Helping to plan club activities for National 4-H Week earn points here.

FFA and 4-H Policy/Updates

Important Reminder: There is an agreement between FFA and 4-H that requires having different projects if an individual participates in both organizations. Specifically, the rule states that "... when an individual belongs to more than one organization, or exhibits as an independent, he/she must carry a different ownership/entrepreneurial project in each organization/independent. ... The projects may not be in the same kind of livestock or crop production classification." For more information, contact the 4-H Office.

2005/2006 Enrollment Updates

Remember, it's important to complete and turn in new enrollment forms for the 2005/2006 program year. The old forms that ask for the number of years a person has been in 4-H will not be accepted. Other enrollment "things to know" are:

- All enrollment forms must go to the Community Club Leader. Forms turned into the 4-H Office by individuals will not be accepted.
- The Community Club Leader must turn in all enrollment forms to the 4-H Office by November 1, 2005.
- Fees for the 2005-2006 4-H Program Year are as follows: Youth = \$25.00

Adult Volunteers = \$4.00

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Up Close and **Personal With** Mary Hall and Sam Diaz

Mary Hall has been involved with the Sutter-Yuba Counties 4-H Program for over 25 years in the Hallwood Club. She started as a sewing project leader and has responded to the call to lead a variety of projects and activities throughout the years. This year, she also serves as Advisor for the Hi 4-H Club, Secretary for the Bi-County Council, and is Chair of a variety of committees.

Mary says she has stayed involved in the program because of the joy she feels as she watches the kids develop their life skills and mature into adults and parents themselves. She believes that *commit*ment is the most important characteristic that a 4-H leader can possess, as well as liking to work with kids and wanting to help them develop the leadership, citizenship and life skills that are the cornerstones of the 4-H Youth Development Program.

Mary's recommendation to new 4-H volunteer leaders is, "Become knowledgeable about the whole program and stick with it!"

Sam Diaz is President for Sutter County on the Bi-County Council. Sam started in 4-H as a swine project leader five years ago with the Barry Club when he wanted to support his children who had enrolled in 4-H. He says he has continued to be involved and has taken on greater leadership responsibilities because, "it's a very rewarding experience," and that it's great to see how appreciative the youth members are when they see camp and other improvements that benefit them. He continues, "it's nice to know that I make some kind of contribution to their future."

Sam also stated that the most important traits that a 4-H Volunteer Leader can possess are moral values, patience, and community pride. And, he says, that's what makes our 4-H Program stand out above other ones—we demonstrate a great deal of pride in all our projects, we have great leaders, and the organization itself continues to grow and develop.

"Get involved and don't be shy," is Sam's advice to new leaders. "We welcome your fresh ideas."
