

Shotgun Discipline Ukiah, CA October 18 - 19, 2008 Cost \$30

A shotgun trainer course will be held



at the Ukiah Gun Club, in Mendocino County. Upon successful completion of this two-day course, participants will be certified as 4-H leader trainers, and will be eligible to serve as shooting sports project leaders, as well as instruct and certify other volunteers in the discipline of shotgun. The course fee includes shotgun shells, clay targets, continental breakfast and lunch both days, and class materials. Teen Leaders may attend, with a participating adult volunteer. The Council has voted to eliminate the county rule that a member can only earn one rank per year, therefore each member has the opportunity to earn the highest star rank for which they qualify. <u>National 4-H Week:</u> Coordinate publicity; obtain judges for window display contest; announce winners at Achievement Night.

<u>Sectional Council</u>: Serve as Bi-County representatives and attend meetings to discuss and conduct business of North Section 4-H Council; give report at following Council meeting.

Achievement Night: Coordinate activities with 4-H Program Representative and support staff; make arrangements with clubs and promote participation and attendance by members.

<u>Craft Day</u>: Coordinate activities with 4-H Program Representative and Clubs. Promote participation and attendance by members.

<u>Presentation Day:</u> Coordinate activities with 4-H Program Representative and support staff; promote participation and attendance by members; serve as judge when needed.

<u>Fashion Revue</u>: Serve on a variety of subcommittees, including decorations, fundraising, line-up, registration, awards, etc. Also, include a pre-event workshop and postevent fundraising fashion show and luncheon.

Spring Fair: Serve on a variety of sub-committees, including coordination of small and large animals, fundraising, still exhibits, presentations, awards, etc.

<u>Horse Fair Show and Projects</u>: Help plan and implement Fair 4-H Horse Show and educational clinics held throughout the year.

<u>Camp Week</u>: Coordinate arrangements and programming activities with Hi 4-H group, 4-H Program Representative and support staff.

Record Book Judging: Participate as judge and obtain trained leaders to serve as judges for annual Record Book judging; conduct training of leaders, members, and families; attends training by State 4-H Office when offered; coordinate activities with 4-H Program Representative and support staff.

<u>Awards</u>: Serve on panel that reviews and approves applications for All Star, Cal Focus and Washington Focus, Senior Awards, Camp scholarships, and other award matters.

<u>Fundraising</u>: Coordinate activities with 4-H Program Representative to develop and implement master fundraising plan for the 4-H Program.

<u>Telephone Tree</u>: Contact Committee and Council members as reminder to attend meetings.

<u>Joys & Concerns</u>: Review news about a joy or concern and recommend what type of response is necessary; then, make arrangements to have appropriate action taken; report on action taken at Council meeting.

<u>Leaders' Dinner:</u> Communicate with leaders about the event; coordinate the meal and program.

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2008 State 4-H Record Book Competition



Time Line:

October 24, 2008 - Books Due to County 4-H Office December 5 - 7, 2008 - State Judging

The Purpose of Record Book Competitions:

- Provides an incentive to members to record their project work and personal achievement in their 4-H Record Book.
- Members receive feedback and encouragement on their 4-H project skill development, leadership and citizenship development, and record-keeping skills.
- Members are recognized for outstanding 4-H work.

Age Eligibility for the 2008 Competition:

Senior 4-H members (at least 14 years of age and no older than 19 years old by December 31 of the program year for which the book is being entered) are eligible to enter state competition. This means that 4-H members born anytime in 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, or 1993 (between January 1, 1989 and December 31, 1993) are eligible.

State 4-H Cover Page - The State 4-H Judging Cover Page must be included with 4-H Record Books entered for State Judging. The Cover Page may not be altered. 4-H Record Books missing the Cover Page will be reason for disqualification.

County Check Sheet - A county check sheet must be included with 4-H Record Books entered for State Judging. A committee, authorized by the County 4-H Office, must complete the checklist and ensure the completeness of the 4-H Record Book. 4-H Record Books missing the Check Sheet will be reason for disqualification.

Previous Years Materials - Materials from all previous years in 4-H must be removed and replaced with a summary of your previous involvement in 4-H (the 4-H member may include all involvement as a 4-H member, including primary). These pages must be placed at the back of the 4-H Record Book and must conform to the standard formatting and page guidelines.
